Local Priorities set by the community.

As Neighbourhood Police officers, we want to know what crimes are having an impact on the community and what the community feel the Police should deal with as a matter of importance. Through Local Action Team meetings, residents who attend have voiced their concerns and from this, they have voted for the following issues they feel the Police should look to resolve:

- Vehicle Crime – Combating and preventing theft from motor vehicle by providing crime prevention advice as well as targeting offenders known for such offences. Local hotspots include roads around Fiveways.
- ASB – Tackle Anti Social Behaviour in the local community, targeting and engaging with youths who are involved in incidents considered to be anti social. Local hotspots include Preston Park.

The above data shows an increase in public place violence and criminal, this in the main is due to youth disorder in an around the Preston Park.

The issue is a priority for Brighton and Hove Police and are working with partners to tackle the issue. We were able to commit extra resources to this specific issue thanks to members of the public coming forward and reporting incidents to us. I am keen to ensure Preston and Fiveways beat area, remains on officer's minds when they are out on patrol and I will always flag emerging trends and issues to my Sergeant to ensure the area receives the Police attention and reassurance it deserves.

It is only a small minority of young people that engage in anti social behaviour that has a negative impact in the community, I would encourage residents to report any incidents of ASB they come across or are aware of.

Stories of interest

"It's such a good service." "My issue was dealt with really well and they made me feel reassured." "It's been brilliant".

These are just some of the responses from satisfied members of the public who have received timely advice and support from the Resolution Centre.

They had been contacted by phone or online, with no need to wait for an appointment, to discuss and resolve their issue.

"We aim to contact the caller within 24 to 48 hours of the initial call and resolve the incident at the earliest opportunity without a need to deploy an officer," said Inspector Paul Williams, who heads a team of 40 officers and staff in the Resolution Centre.

"Available 8am to 10pm, seven days a week, we deal with issues where there is a low threat or risk of harm and where the incident is not an emergency."

Assistant Chief Constable Robin Smith said: "Previously we sent officers to many incidents and very large proportion of these could be resolved without deploying a unit at all.

"Our aim is for the Resolution Centre, which is now fully staffed, to manage 41,000 incidents a year, reducing the number of deployments of frontline staff. However, there will be incidents which cannot be resolved using the resources of the Resolution Centre. If this occurs we will endeavour to send the incident to the most appropriate team to deal with.

"We are continuously evaluating the service we provide and are pleased with the feedback we are getting - 'really thorough' and 'supportive' is just what I like to hear."

With such early resolution there are fewer abstractions from response officers to attend appointments.

Response officer PC Kim May, from Bognor, said: "With fewer pre-planned appointments to attend we are more resilient in our ability to respond to emergency calls. This allows us to spend more time with victims as there isn't the pressure of the build up of non-emergency calls to deal with.

"The extra time will enable us to deal with people by other means such as community resolution, which in the past hasn't been possible to consider due to lack of time and resilience."
